Normative frameworks and recommendations related to the problematic nexus of gender and communication have been elaborated over the past two decades, starting with the Platform for Action adopted at the Beijing World Conference on Women (1995) and moving on to the World Summit on the Information Society (2003-2005) and its follow ups.
